#### **ALBANIA**



**Aida Serjanaj**, born on 05.12.1964, in Tirana, Albania works at the Center of Educational Services, having graduated from the University of Tirana, Faculty of Political and Juridical Science, Philosophy branch, in 1987. Aida has taught high school since 2007 and is trained in Citizenship Education, Human Rights Education: national and international activities.

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Astrit Dautaj, born on 09.09.1959, graduated from the University of Tirana, Faculty of Political and Juridical Science, Philosophy branch, in 1983 and from the Faculty of Law in 1999. Astrit works at the Agency for Quality Assurance in Pre-university Education (ASCAP) and heads the Curriculum Development in the Directorate for Curriculum and Teacher qualification. He is responsible for Citizenship Education and Social studies curricula in Pre-university education. His numerous contributions to Albania's education system include authoring high school textbooks and teaching materials for social studies, coordinating social studies projects, crafting new citizenship education standards and assessment performance criteria for social studies and citizenship education, among others. He has served as core group member for policy development issues and curriculum reforms and collaborated in international projects under the auspices of the Council of Europe. He is a member of EPAN.

She has been working as expert and trainer in the Council of Europe and European Wergeland Center's programs on HRE/EDC, as well as expert collaborator and coordinator for Greece on the "Living Democracy" and "CORE" projects (Children of Refugees in Education).

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**Dr. Angelos Vallianatos** (PhD in Theology) has worked as a teacher and school advisor in Athens, Greece.
